

Faith is a gift. Especially in this day and age, it is easier to doubt than to believe. We see something online or hear something from a friend. Do we believe it or not? Time and again in the Gospels we see Jesus perform a miracle. Even among those who see it, some believe it and some do not. Some who hear about it later come to believe; others, scoff and doubt. On Easter morning, Peter and the beloved disciple see the empty tomb and the burial cloths neatly arranged. Neither understood what Jesus had told them about rising from the dead, but the beloved disciple "saw and believed". He saw with eyes of faith. Eventually, the other disciples, even Thomas, would also see and believe. As they go forth to give witness to what they have seen and heard and come to know, some of those they meet choose to see with eyes of faith and some do not.

Yesterday evening, men and women around the world were baptized and initiated into the Catholic faith. They have chosen to see the world with eyes of faith. With eyes of faith, they are able to see meaning in their lives beyond what is visible in this world. With eyes of faith, they can see forgiveness for the sins they have committed. With eyes of faith, they may see the face of Christ in those in need. With eyes of faith, they are able to see their suffering in the light of Jesus' suffering. With eyes of faith, they may remain ever hopeful in eternal salvation. They can then bear witness to all this, as generations and generations of disciples have done over the last two thousand years.

Note that only three disciples are mentioned in John's account of the discovery of the empty tomb on Easter morning: Mary of Magdala, Simon Peter, and the disciple whom Jesus loved. Where were all the others? It's possible that they were in hiding. They had every reason to fear being arrested and tried as accomplices, as associates of the man who had just been crucified. Perhaps they had sealed themselves off from the outside world as tightly as any tomb. They had to be raised from their despair. Only after they had been raised to their new life were they able to bear witness, to preach the Good News, to make disciples of all nations. We may not literally be in hiding, but we may be overwhelmed by the darkness, the dangers, and the despair in the world. Let us look to God, who has the power to raise us from our tombs, to restore us to life, to lead us to new life in the Lord. How do I see my life and my world differently with eyes of faith?

April 27: Sunday of Divine Mercy

On the Second Sunday of Easter, the Church celebrates the Sunday of Divine Mercy. It provides an important opportunity to share Christ's message of mercy, especially with those who suffer because of their participation in one or more abortions. By the age of 45, as many as 1 in 3 women have had an abortion, and a similar number of men and family members have been involved. Many feel that abortion is "the unforgivable sin." They need to hear that, through the Sacrament of Reconciliation, God forgives every sin of a repentant heart, even the sin of abortion. In fact, Jesus' message to St. Faustina is that the greater the sinner, the greater the right to His mercy.



The Divine Mercy image was revealed to St. Faustina in a vision in 1931. The Lord instructed her to

paint an image according to the pattern you see with the signature: Jesus, I trust in You. I promise that the soul that will venerate this image will not perish. I also promise

victory over {its} enemies already here on earth, especially at the hour of death (*47, *48).

From the Lord she heard the meaning of the rays in the Image. The two rays denote Blood and Water. The pale ray stands for the Water which makes souls righteous. The red ray stands for the Blood which is the life of souls. These two rays issued forth from the depths of My tender mercy when My agonized Heart was opened by a lance on the Cross. (*299). By means of this image I shall grant many graces to souls. It is to be a reminder of the demands of My mercy, because even the strongest faith is of no avail without works.
