From the Desk of...

Deacon José Zamora, Pastoral Leader

Saint Paul's description of the Eucharist in his letter to the Corinthians is remarkably similar to one we could write today. The words are nearly the same as what we hear in each eucharistic prayer, including the memorial acclamation. When it comes to the celebration of the Eucharist, we have at least one thing in common with Paul: none of us were present at the Last Supper. And yet, we all can describe it so very well. This is the power of ritual. Already by when this letter was written, about twenty years or so after the death and resurrection of Jesus, the ritual of the Eucharist was well established. Nearly two thousand years later, we still celebrate the Eucharist in a similar way and he is still present in his Body and Blood every single time.

Jesus' offering of his Body and Blood at the Last Supper prefigures the offering he was about to make the very next day. At the Last Supper, he allowed his Body to be broken and his Blood to be poured out and gave himself to his disciples. Doing the same on the cross, he gave himself to us all. Throughout his ministry, he modeled for his disciples what he asked them to do: preach repentance, heal the sick, call disciples. Then at the Last Supper, he modeled the sacrifice he would make on the cross. As his disciples now, our lives are the gifts from God that we sacrifice, allowing ourselves to be offered, even broken, for others.

It was reasonable for the disciples to think that it will be impossible to provide food for the entire crowd of over five thousand. All they have are five loaves and two fish. Not even one percent of that crowd would be satisfied with such little food. But on this day the crowd learns the abundance of God's generosity. We may be overwhelmed by the few resources we have to address such huge needs—hunger, malnutrition, disease, poverty, homelessness—in poorer countries especially, but also right here in our nation and even in our communities. May this Gospel remind us that when we become the body of Christ we can see miracles happen. During the week ahead, how will I offer myself in imitation of Jesus to nourish or sustain someone else?

VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL








